

Rabbi's Message | Bet Hasdai RABBI DAVID E. OSTRICH

The story is told of a Hassidic Rebbe traveling late on a Friday afternoon. His return from a journey had taken longer than expected, and his Hassidim were anxiously milling around the synagogue as the sky got darker and darker. Eventually, it was night— Shabbos, and he was still not home. Finally, two hours into the Sabbath, the Rebbe's carriage came rolling into the village—with the Rebbe smiling and wishing all, "Gut Shabbes." The Hassidim were glad that he was safe, but they were in shock at their holy Rebbe desecrating the Sabbath. No one had the courage to question him, but after all the Sabbath prayers had been recited, someone finally asked, "Rebbe, how could you have broken Shabbos?" The Rebbe nodded at the question and then explained: "Yes, I saw it getting darker and darker and was worried about breaking Shabbos. However, a miracle happened. It was Shabbos on my right and Shabbos on my left, and it was Shabbos above me, but," he continued, "where we were driving, it was not yet Shabbos."

As absurd as this "miracle story" might sound, it speaks to a dual truth about life and time. The calendar keeps rolling along regardless of what happens in the world, but some things on the calendar only happen when we make them happen.

Shabbat is a perfect example. Though Shabbat begins when the sun sets, Jews are instructed to "make" Shabbat by lighting the candles and blessing the wine. Note the phrasing in Exodus 31.16-17 (a passage we call V'shamru): "The Children of Israel shall keep the Sabbath, la'asot et haShabbat /

making the Sabbath throughout their generations..." There is a Shabbat that is astronomical/halachic, and there is what we could call effective Shabbat, the Shabbat we make.

This double reality is also reflected in our traditions of Bar Mitzvah and Bat Mitzvah. A young person achieves the legal status simply by turning thirteen (or twelve for girls in traditional circles). No ritual or party is necessary. However, we have developed the rituals and the celebration to make the age religiously significant—to impress upon the young person his/her possibilities as a fully participating member of the Jewish community. The calendar rolls along regardless of what we do, but we are called to mark the calendar occasions with our religious awareness.

We do not, however, operate in a vacuum. Depending on our circumstances and moods, we bring to our religious observances different sensibilities. This year, for example, the holidays of Chanukah, Purim, and Passover have arrived on schedule, but, in times of war, their religious messages have resonated differently than in other years. Some Jews have wondered about celebrating while the tragedy of war continues, but others rejoice that, in this time of oppression and existential threat for the Jewish people, we can fight back. The calendar does not sense a difference, but we who make the holy days are certainly doing so with an awareness of our current reality.

This is nothing new. Think of all the centuries, places, and situations in which our

I want to sincerely thank the board members who have diligently volunteered and will be leaving the board this year: Lauren Gluckman, Religious Chair and Amy Paulson, Secretary. On Sunday, May 5 at II:00 A.M., a Yom HaShoa event will take place in the sanctuary for our students and our congregation. Our students will read poetry and a brunch will take place following the Service. Yom HaShoah, Holocaust Remembrance Day, is observed as Israel's day of commemoration for the approximately six million Jews and five million others who perished in the Holocaust. We hope you will join us for this commemoration.

Yom Ha'atzmaut, Israeli Independence Day, takes place on May 14 as Israel becomes 76 years old. On our Sabbatical year in Haifa, Shari and Suzy attended a public elementary school. For the Yom Ha'atzmaut celebration, all the children wore white shirts and shorts and carried Israeli flags. It is a beautiful memory of our daughters and their Israeli schoolmates, singing and dancing.

Other holidays in May and June are Lag B'Omer, celebrated on May 26. Shavuot, which begins on June II, marks the giving of the Torah on Mt. Sinai over 3,300 years ago. A celebration and dinner will take place that evening, followed by a special Torah luncheon on Wednesday the I2.

In the past few weeks, many college campuses and religious organizations have been facing demonstrations and antisemitism. We are aware of this in State College and at Penn State and are fortunate to have the support of our local authorities throughout our Town and Gown. We must all hope for better days ahead, in our community, our country and in our homeland, Israel.


The month of April is a busy one. We have little caterpillars that arrived a week ago. We are watching the transformation of the caterpillars turning into butterflies right before our eyes!

Tradition has been practiced. In every generation, whether the conditions were ideal or not, our people have responded to the religious imperative to live in relationship with the Divine—and have sought to find the religious and cultural messages that speak to our holy days.

Sometimes, the challenges were excruciating. The *Sh'aylot uT'shuvot / Responsa* asked and answered during the Holocaust are among the most interesting and tortured in our traditional literature. Though their settings were not "ideal," our people still wanted to observe our religion, and they asked for guidance in accommodating to their unique and tragic circumstances. From those years, there is also this story told by Rabbi Yaakov Halpern (z'l). As a teenager in Auschwitz, he happened

to be in the same barracks as a famous Hassidic Rebbe. The Rabbi's prayer accoutrement—prayer book, Tallis, and Tefillin—had been destroyed or desecrated by the Nazis, but he had managed to find a single and empty Tefillin box. The straps had been torn out and the scrolls destroyed, but the Rebbe held that empty leather box with reverence and devotion as he davvened with all his heart. The Rebbe did not survive the camp, but the empty Tefillin box was somehow left in the barracks and young Yaakov found it. Many years later, at a Rabbinic gathering, Yaakov told us the story and then held out the empty Tefillin box for all to see. It was just a leather shell, but it was full of kavannah. It was not kosher, but it was exceedingly and profoundly holy.

On one level of Jewishness, there is the Halachah that identifies dates on the calendar and times of the day, seeing them as cues for religious rituals. There is a scheduled rhythm of Jewish life and rules, and we are bidden to be obedient. However there is also a psychological, emotional, and spiritual level where the sacred needs to be made by humans. Whatever our situations—be they ideal or not, we are invited to an awareness of God. Whether it is a "regular" Shabbat or Yom Kippur—or one where we are evacuating from a hurricane, or involved in a war, or still mourning the recent deaths of loved ones, God is present in our lives, and we are urged to open our spiritual eyes to receive the Divine. At every moment of life, God is with us, guiding and embracing us, and our religion reminds us to pay attention.

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
